LANE CLOSURE SCHEDULED THIS WEEKEND AT THE CANADIAN NATIONAL RAILROAD BRIDGE ON THE TRI-STATE TOLLWAY (I-294) FOR BRIDGE WORK

Overnight delays expected during ongoing bridge maintenance work

DOWNERS GROVE, IL – Overnight lane closures are scheduled this weekend on the northbound Tri-State Tollway (I-294) between I-290 and Balmoral Avenue for ongoing bridge work at the Canadian National Railroad (CNRR) bridge. Delays are expected.

Electronic message signs and construction signage will be put in place in advance to alert drivers to the closures. The closure is necessary to provide a work zone that safely accommodates the construction. All work is weather dependent.

In 2017, the Illinois Tollway has scheduled maintenance and repairs on bridges and retaining walls at several locations along the central Tri-State Tollway (I-294), as well as roadway lighting, drainage and median work. This work is scheduled to be complete by the end of the year.

Weather permitting, on Saturday, August 12, at 6 p.m., one northbound lane is scheduled to close with a second lane scheduled to close at 8 p.m. and a third at 9 p.m. One lane is scheduled to reopen by 5 a.m. on Sunday, August 13, with a second lane scheduled to reopen by 9 a.m. and all lanes by 10 a.m.

Traffic on northbound I-294 at the railroad bridge is currently shifted to provide a work zone for the ongoing repairs. The repairs at this location are expected to be complete this summer.

The project is being coordinated with the Illinois Department of Transportation and DuPage County, along with local municipalities and police and fire departments.

Maintenance and repair work on the Tri-State Tollway is necessary to extend the life of the bridge and retaining wall structures and enable the Tollway to provide safe and convenient travel for customers. The work is part of the Illinois Tollway's 15-year, \$14 billion capital program, *Move Illinois: The Illinois Tollway Driving the Future*.

Work Zone Safety

The Illinois Tollway is committed to ensuring that the Central Tri-State Tollway (I-294) and other area roadways remain safe for both drivers and workers during construction, which is part of the agency's overall commitment to roadway safety.

Construction zone speed limits are in effect in all construction zones 24/7 and drivers should continue to watch for changing traffic patterns and use caution, especially when workers are present. On I-294, a 45 mph work zone speed limit is in effect throughout the construction season.

Illinois State Police have zero tolerance for drivers speeding in work zones. The minimum penalty for speeding in a work zone is \$375. Posted signs advise drivers of a \$10,000 fine and a 14-year jail sentence for hitting a roadway worker.

About the Illinois Tollway

The Illinois Tollway is a user-fee system that receives no state or federal funds for maintenance and operations. The agency maintains and operates 292 miles of roadways in 12 counties in Northern Illinois, including the Reagan Memorial Tollway (I-88), the Veterans Memorial Tollway (I-355), the Jane Addams Memorial Tollway (I-90), the Tri-State Tollway (I-94/I-294/I-80) and the Illinois Route 390 Tollway.
