## **ILLINOIS TOLLWAY PREPARED FOR SLEET, SNOW AND FREEZING RAIN** *Drivers urged to slow down and watch for slick areas on roadways*

**DOWNERS GROVE, IL** – The Illinois Tollway is deploying snowplows in response to sleet, snow and freezing rain expected to fall Thursday, possibly creating icy patches in some areas that could affect commuters during the evening rush hour. The Tollway's Snow Operations Center is open to manage the agency's systemwide response.

"Our trucks will be salting the roadways to prevent ice from forming as the temperatures drop and the moisture on the pavement begins to freeze," said Illinois Tollway Executive Director Greg Bedalov. "Roadway conditions may vary as temperatures fall below freezing, so we ask drivers to please slow down, increase their distance from the vehicles ahead of them and be alert for slippery areas, especially on elevated ramps and bridges."

Drivers whose vehicles become disabled should activate their hazard lights and dial \*999 from a cellphone for assistance from Illinois State Police District 15. Drivers will be asked to note the roadway they are using, as well as the direction of travel and nearest milepost or crossroad. For crashes involving property damage only, drivers should report the incident to 630-241-6800 ext. 5042 and continue driving.

When traveling, drivers should be alert to any vehicle on the side of the road with emergency or hazard lights flashing and remember to [Give Them Distance](#) by obeying the Move Over Law by slowing down and changing lanes safely.

### **Illinois Tollway Keeps Drivers Informed**

In addition to working to keep roads free of snow and ice, the Illinois Tollway provides drivers with information to help them reach their destinations safely during winter weather events.

The Illinois Tollway's Traffic and Incident Management System provides real-time travel times and roadway conditions on over-the-road electronic message signs throughout the Tollway.

### **Tollway Travel Tips**

The Tollway offers the following [tips for winter weather events](#):

- Slow down and leave enough time to reach your destination.
- Do not make sudden lane changes and always use your turn signal.
- Don't follow too closely and increase your intervals between vehicles.

- Reduce speed on ramps and toll plazas.
- Remember to always wear your safety belt and ensure children under the age of 8 are securely restrained in child safety seats.
- Don't text or use a hand-held cellphone while driving. Both are illegal.
