EDENS SPUR TOLLWAY (I-94) RECONSTRUCTION SCHEDULED TO BEGIN

Work will require long-term lane reductions, ramp and local road closures between Pfingsten Road and the Edens Expressway

DOWNERS GROVE, IL – Lane reductions are scheduled this week to begin reconstruction of the Edens Spur Tollway (I-94). Work to reconstruct the Edens Spur, between Pfingsten Road and the Edens Expressway, includes removing existing pavement and replacing it with new, full-depth asphalt pavement. In addition, nine mainline bridges will be removed and replaced as part of this work.

Weather permitting, on Thursday, July 26, Edens Spur traffic will be reduced to a single lane in both directions between Pfingsten Road and Skokie Boulevard for work to prepare for a long-term traffic shift. The outside shoulder will remain open during this stage of work, which is scheduled to last for about three weeks.

Electronic message signs and construction signage will be put in place in advance to alert drivers to the closures and construction work. Up to 57,000 vehicles use the Edens Spur daily.

As work begins to reconstruct the Edens Spur, all traffic will be shifted onto the westbound side of the roadway with one lane of traffic in both directions to accommodate reconstruction of the eastbound side. Traffic is expected to stay in this configuration through the end of the year.

Over the winter, eastbound traffic will be returned to the eastbound side, however traffic in both directions will remain reduced to a single lane to facilitate ongoing bridge work. In the spring, all traffic will be shifted onto the eastbound side and work to reconstruction the westbound lanes will begin. The mainline pavement work is scheduled to be complete by the end of 2019.

The work is being coordinated with the Illinois Department of Transportation, Cook County and the Village of Northbrook, as well as local municipalities, fire and police departments.

The Edens Spur Improvement Project will involve removing and replacing all the existing mainline asphalt pavement and repairs to concrete pavement, including replacing or repairing mainline bridges. Additional work includes replacing the Pfingsten Road Bridge, repairing the Waukegan Road Bridge over the Edens Spur, constructing the barrier separated median with stormwater improvements and upgrading ITS and roadway lighting. All work is scheduled to be complete in 2020.

These repairs are necessary to extend the life of the roadway and provide safe and convenient travel for Tollway customers. This work is part of the Tollway's 15-year, \$14 billion capital program, *Move Illinois: The Illinois Tollway Driving the Future.*

Work Zone Safety

The Illinois Tollway is committed to ensuring the Edens Spur Tollway (I-94) remain safe for both drivers and workers during construction, which is part of the agency's overall commitment to roadway safety.

Work zone speed limits are in effect in all construction zones 24/7 and drivers should continue to watch for changing traffic patterns and use caution, especially when workers are present.

In addition, the Illinois Tollway reminds motorists that the "Move Over Law" requires motorists to change lanes or to slow down and proceed with caution when passing any vehicle on the side of the road with hazard lights activated. If you see flashing lights ahead, please move over or slow down.

Illinois State Police have zero tolerance for drivers speeding in work zones or failure to comply with the Move Over Law.

The minimum penalty for speeding in a work zone is \$375. Posted signs advise drivers of a \$10,000 fine and a 14-year jail sentence for hitting a roadway worker. Penalties for failure to slow down or move over for a vehicle on the shoulder with flashing lights includes up to a \$10,000 fine, 2-year suspension of driving privileges and jail time, in extreme cases.
